Much has been achieved, thanks to the commitment of truly excellent volunteers, organizational leaders focused on providing effective advocacy and value, and members who are willing to get directly engaged in programs and services for the common good.

Our growth and participation levels demonstrate that we are doing what our community members want. The success of our programs not only adds to the overall strength of the organization, but also enhances the strength of core initiatives like academic achievement, mentoring, health and wellness, and social responsibility.

Coupled with the generous support of area sponsors, we ensured the financial stability of our programs as well as provided much-needed support to area disadvantaged families, and our expanded efforts placed the interests of our community squarely at the forefront during the 2nd Annual Christmas Community Celebration in Support of Toys for Tots through collection of over 2,000 toys for distribution to needy area youth.

The Organization

The overall concept of the 100 Black Men organization was born in New York City in 1963, when a diverse group of concerned and successful African American men began to meet to explore ways of improving conditions in their communities. They envisioned an organization that would implement programs designed to improve the quality of life for African Americans and other minorities.

These members were successful black men from various walks of life who decided to pool their skills and experiences to ensure the future of their communities by aiming an intense number of resources toward youth development. They eventually adopted the name 100 Black Men, Inc. Among the founders were David Dinkins, Livingston Wingate, Andrew Hatcher, and Jackie Robinson.

In the 1970s, the concept of developing individual, independent chapters in other cities took hold, and in 1976, the 100 Black Men of New Jersey was formed by Dr. William Hayling and other colleagues. A movement had been born. Men across the country began to form 100 Black Men organizations in cities like Los Angeles, St. Louis, Indianapolis, Pittsburgh, Atlanta, San Francisco/Oakland Bay area, Nassau/Suffolk, and Sacramento.

In 1986, the nine successful chapters met and voted to create 100 Black Men of America, Inc. as a national confederation. Currently, there are more than 100 chapters and more than 10,000 members. The Board of Directors consists of the presidents of the local chapters. For the past four decades, chapters across the nation have touched the lives of over 60,000 young people.

100 Black Men of Madison, Inc.

100 Black Men of Madison, Inc. began its operation in 1994 and was incorporated in 1995 as a nonprofit organization comprised of members from many professional disciplines in the greater Madison area. The Madison chapter was established with the concept that it would make a positive difference in the lives of area youth, especially African American males and females, through mentoring, education, health and wellness, and economic development programs. The 100 Black Men of Madison, Inc. is an affiliate of 100 Black Men of America, Inc.

The 100 Black Men of Madison organization has and will continue to be a positive voice for the community youth of color, especially African American males and females, and support academic achievement and reinforce social responsibility.

Mission, Vision and Values

The Mission of 100 Black Men of Madison, Inc. is to improve the quality of life within our communities and enhance educational and economic opportunities for all African Americans. 100 Black Men of Madison, Inc. seeks to serve as a beacon of leadership by utilizing our diverse talents to create environments where our children are motivated to achieve, and to empower our people to become self-sufficient shareholders in the economic and social fabric of the communities we serve. 100 Black Men of Madison, Inc. is committed to the intellectual development of youth and the economic empowerment of the African American community based on the following precepts: respect for family, spirituality, justice, and integrity.

Summary of 2012 Programs of the 100 Black Men of Madison, Inc.



African American Achievement Team (AAAT) Class

La Follette High School - Madison, Wisconsin

Being a young Black man in the 21st century is difficult. Irrespective of financial means or support from home, Black youth often find themselves in negative and indifferent environments. Focusing on that fact, the African American Achievement Team (AAAT) takes a clear look at the challenges confronting our young Black men and endeavors to provide context and insight to the successful negotiations of those abutments. The goal for each youth who participates in the AAAT program is to improve academic skills,

promote positive relationships among peers and adults, encourage a positive attitude toward learning and high achievement, improve GPA each semester and graduate with a 2.5 GPA or higher.

Conducted at La Follette High School in Madison, Wisconsin, the AAAT is actualized in twelve classes taught by successful and committed Black men who share their history and perspective on a variety of topics designed to prepare African American male youth with the mindset and the tools to be successful. Topics covered include: challenges, making good choices and consequences of poor choices, drugs and alcohol, STDs and AIDS, dress and style, hip-hop culture, respect for others, Black history, values of the Black community, diversity, career planning, role of athletics, getting good grades, and skills needed to succeed in life.

The African American Achievement Team was started in 2007 by Eric Summers and John Milton. The La Follette liaisons are Michele Olson and Terry Meissen.

Leopold and Orchard Ridge Elementary School Reading Projects

Leopold Elementary and Orchard Ridge Elementary Schools – Madison, Wisconsin

To address the achievement gap of area youth, the 100 Black Men of Madison have established reading programs at Leopold and Orchard Ridge Elementary Schools of the Madison Metropolitan School District. More than 200 hours per semester are devoted to reading to children (Kindergarten-4th grade) by members of 100 Black Men of Madison, Inc.

African American History Challenge Bowl

The 100 Black Men of Madison African American History Challenge Bowl (AAHCB) is an educational program designed to enhance the study of African American history. The AAHCB is open to all Madison-area middle school students with the goal to encourage pride, self-worth



and an appreciation of the African American legacy and culture. It also is a challenging and fun way for students to expand their knowledge of African American History in highly competitive local and national competitions. The 2012 winner of the local and national competitions was the team from Hamilton Middle School.

The chief authorities for the African American History Challenge bowl were the sixth revised edition of "Before the Mayflower" by Lerone Bennett, Jr. and "The Negro in the Making of America" by Benjamin Quarles.

Mentor and Educator Appreciation Breakfast

Today, within the context of our community, there are few actions more important than the education of African American children. In concert with our Mission and Values, the 100 Black Men of Madison recognized those educators and mentors who have demonstrated an extraordinary sense of humility and a strong commitment to continual improvement, based upon a fundamental motivation to inspire student success. During the 2nd annual event, those who have made positive differences in the lives of our children were recognized and celebrated.

- Displays exemplary interpersonal skills in communicating with African American students, parents, administrators, community members and professional colleagues; and
- Engages African American parents/families as partners in the learning process to enhance student achievement.



STEM Explorers Program



In execution of "The 100 Way: Developing Leaders with an Appreciation of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM)" grant, the 100 Black Men of Madison's Educational Committee partnered with The Town Center at the Wisconsin Institute for Discovery (WID) to develop the STEM Explorers program for middle and high school students throughout the greater Madison area. This program consisted of six, one and a half hour long interactive sessions covering the following STEM-related topics: Stem Cells, Educational Gaming, The Science of Sound, Nanotechnology, Mushrooms and Fungus, and The Current Status of Minorities in STEM. Except for The Science of Sound, which was held on a Saturday morning, all sessions were held from 4:30-6:00 p.m. on Monday afternoons

and performed in state-of-the-art scientific labs and conference rooms at the WID. The Science of Sound session was delivered as a WID-wide science fair style event. All sessions were presented by scientists at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

The goal of the STEM Explorers Program was to introduce students to various STEM topics in a relaxed and entertaining environment. At the end of each session, the students completed a questionnaire to assess their opinions of the value and quality of each learning experience. In all sessions, the students believed that they had obtained a significant enhancement in their understanding of the covered topic. Also, as indicated by the decrease in the standard deviations from the before-to-after-measurement, this increase in knowledge was experienced by most of the students regardless of their perceived prior knowledge.

Mingling, Mentoring and Mama's Treats

Members of the African American professional community, local high school students, and university students and faculty of the University of Wisconsin attended Mingling, Mentoring and Mama's Treats on 12 September. This event offered an opportunity for social interaction and information sharing among a group of high school, college and older African American men with similar career interests. With the theme of "Intergenerational Mentoring," the goal of the activity was to initiate cross-generational mentoring relationships.



Economic Development

As a result of a request for the inclusion of people of color and women in City of Madison contracting opportunities, an Amendment to the City of Madison's 2013 budget, which provides \$400,000 to conduct a disparity study to determine the feasibility of including Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) firms in Public Works construction projects, passed 13 November 2012. Led by the Economic Development Committee of the 100 Black Men of Madison and backed by Mayor Paul Soglin, this historic Amendment states that a disparity study is necessary to establish a basis to include DBE goal setting in projects not receiving federal assistance. The 100Black Men of Madison positively and productively worked with Mayor Soglin and his staff for eight months to address this critical issue of economic development for our community.

"Remember to Believe" Summit for African American Males

16 November 2012

The purpose of the one-day Summit was to address the ongoing concerns that the parents, students, schools and community are wrestling with today. Those concerns are attrition rates, academic achievement, social and personal responsibilities, suspension, and incarceration rates of our youth. It is our belief that if we wait for others to address our youth and their issues, the outcome will be what we see now: low self-esteem, lack of goals and dreams, and poor academic motivation, thus creating frustration, which leads to aggressive behaviors that ultimately end up with incarceration or death (both physical as well as psychological).

Christmas Community Celebration in Support of Toys for Tots

At this event, over 2,000 toys were collected for distribution to needy area youth. In lieu of admission fees, attendees were asked to bring an unwrapped gift worth \$15 or more to donate. In addition, a Corporate Challenge was fused into this year's activity.


